# Character Study: Daniel Part 4 – Daniel Interprets the Second Dream Daniel 4:1-37

## What's happening?

- King Nebuchadnezzar had a second dream that troubled him like the first. Once again, only <u>Daniel</u> could give the interpretation. Chapter 4 is the king's account of how God worked in his life. (4:1-9)
- Nebuchadnezzar explained that in his dream he saw a big <u>tree</u> that could be seen to the ends of the earth, which provided shade and fruit for everyone. Then he saw a messenger come from heaven saying that the tree needed to be <u>cut down</u>, leaving only the stump, in order to show that the Most High is sovereign over the kingdoms of men. (4:10-17)
- Daniel was troubled, but yet told the king the dream's meaning. He told King Nebuchadnezzar that he was the mighty tree, but that God would strip him of his <u>power</u>. Even worse, the king would dwell in the <u>fields</u> and eat grass with the animals until he recognized God as the Most High. Daniel encouraged him to turn from his <u>pride</u>, hoping that would prolong his kingdom. (4:18-27)
- Nebuchadnezzar continued in his pride for another year. Then God's word came to pass and he lost his <u>throne</u>. The king found himself living as an <u>animal</u> in a field. His hair and nails grew long as he faced the lowest point of his life. (4:28-33)
- Over time, the king came to understand that the God of heaven truly works His will and is worthy of <u>honor</u>. He blessed and praised the everlasting God. By God's hand, the king was <u>restored</u> to his position as king over Babylon, and his majesty was restored as well. (4:34-37)

## What's God doing?

> Nebuchadnezzar was a <u>powerful</u> man, but he failed to recognize God's sovereignty over all things, including the kings and kingdoms of the earth. God knew it would take <u>extreme</u> <u>measures</u> to change this prideful king's heart, but in the end, he came to see God for who He is.

#### What's to learn?

→ We often attribute "<u>power</u>" to the wealthy and esteemed people in society. But no one compares to God's power. In fact, no one comes close. We must either willingly admit that or God will <u>humble</u> us until we face that reality. He is the Creator and we are the creation, period!

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
