Character Study: Daniel Part 5 – Belshazzar and the Writing on the Wall Daniel 5:1-31

What's happening?

- Chapter 5 of Daniel picks up our story years after the death of King Nebuchadnezzar. A new king, named Belshazzar, was ruling over Babylon.
- King Belshazzar hosted a great feast in which people drank from vessels taken from the <u>temple</u> of the Lord and praised various false gods. At this feast, the king had an experience which terribly frightened him. He saw the <u>fingers</u> of a man's hand appear and write a <u>message</u> on the wall of the palace. (5:1-6)
- Terrified, the king called for someone to give its interpretation. Daniel was eventually brought in and told that he would be given great rewards and the third highest position in the kingdom if he could give the meaning. (5:7-12)
- Daniel explained how King Nebuchadnezzar had been humbled by God, but that Belshazzar still remained full of <u>pride</u>. Through his actions, the king had lifted himself up against the Lord of heaven. (5:13-23)
- The phrase on the wall was "MENE, MENE, TEKEL, UPHARSIN." Daniel explained MENE meant: "God has numbered your kingdom and <u>finished</u> it." TEKEL meant: "You have been weighed in the balances and found <u>wanting</u>." And PERES meant: "Your kingdom has been <u>divided</u> and given to the Medes and Persians." (5:24-28)
- Belshazzar rewarded Daniel as he had said, but later that night the king was killed. <u>Darius</u> the <u>Mede</u> took over the kingdom. (5:29-31)

What's God doing?

> Babylon had a new king, but a similar problem. Belshazzar, like Nebuchadnezzar, was full of <u>pride</u>. The God of heaven needed to teach this king who the true God was. This was a fulfillment of <u>prophecy</u> (Dan. 2) and another example of God's <u>sovereignty</u> over mankind.

What's to learn?

→ Daniel had experienced more blessings than this powerful king of Babylon. God's <u>hand</u> was on Daniel, but His <u>judgment</u> was on Belshazzar. Regardless of the riches this world may offer, we see the ultimate question in life is whether or not we are on God's side.

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
