## Character Study: Ezra Part 1 – Ezra Prepares the People to Return Home Ezra 7:1-8:23

## What's happening?

• Ezra was a <u>priest</u> in the family line of Aaron. He is described as being a "skilled <u>scribe</u> in the Law of Moses," who had a heart to know, obey and teach God's Word. (7:1-10)

• Ezra lived at a time when Judah (the Southern Kingdom) was returning home from their exile in <u>Babylon</u>. It was because of sin that God had allowed the Babylonians to take the Israelites captive (586 BC). After the Persians overthrew Babylon under <u>Cyrus</u> the Great (538 BC), the people were allowed to return home.

• <u>Zerubbabel</u> had led the first group of Israelites back to Jerusalem to rebuild the <u>Temple</u> (538 BC; note Ezra 1:1-5). Now, eighty years later, under the reign of <u>Artaxerxes</u>, Ezra was given permission to lead a second group back. (7:11-26)

• As Ezra gathered those interested in returning to their homeland (about 4,000-5,000 people), he had a time of <u>fasting</u> and <u>prayer</u>, requesting God's protection on the long journey they had ahead. He could have requested additional assistance from the king, but he knew that this trip would show God to be the One who <u>protects</u> His people. (8:1-23)

## What's God doing?

> Israel had split into two kingdoms after Solomon's reign. The Northern Kingdom was taken into captivity by the <u>Assyrians</u> in 722 BC and never returned. The tribes of Judah and Benjamin made up the Southern Kingdom, which was taken into captivity by the <u>Babylonians</u>. God used Ezra to lead people from Babylon back to Jerusalem as a means of <u>preserving</u> His people and keeping the <u>promises</u> He made to David (note II Sam. 7:4-16).

## What's to learn?

 $\rightarrow$  Ezra had a passion to continually <u>learn</u> more about God, and <u>share</u> with others what he was learning. He also had a trust in God that showed his <u>faith</u> was real. Can people see in your life a faith that is real?

 $\rightarrow$  Although God's people faced consequences for their sin, God did not <u>forsake</u> them. God's sovereign hand of protection was over His people at all times, just as it is with us today.

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
