Character Study: Nehemiah Part 5 – Proven Character Nehemiah 13:1-31

What's happening?

• After the walls of Jerusalem had been rebuilt, Nehemiah made a return trip to visit <u>Artaxerxes</u>, the king who had given him permission to rebuild Jerusalem. Though we do not know how long Nehemiah stayed in Persia, we do know that when he returned to Jerusalem, he was <u>not happy</u> with the situation he found. (13:1-6)

• Nehemiah learned that Tobiah, the man who had caused trouble earlier, was now living in a <u>room</u> inside the <u>Temple</u>. He also discovered that the Israelites were not <u>tithing</u>, and therefore not supporting the priests who worked in the Temple. Nehemiah threw Tobiah out, and got the people to begin tithing again, which allowed the priests to do their job. (13:7-14)

• Nehemiah also found that people were working on the <u>Sabbath</u> and even marrying foreign <u>women</u>, both of which God had forbidden in the Law for their nation. Nehemiah took a stand against these acts, and the people responded in <u>obedience</u>. (13:15-31)

What's God doing?

> God had made Nehemiah into a great <u>leader</u>, both in his ability to oversee work <u>projects</u> and also in his ability to demonstrate godly <u>character</u>. God used Nehemiah not only to rebuild the city wall, but also to keep the people <u>pure</u> and <u>obedient</u>.

What's to learn?

 \rightarrow People will always follow a leader. For that reason, godly leaders must always take into consideration what kind of <u>example</u> they are setting, not only by their <u>actions</u>, but also by their <u>character</u>.

 \rightarrow A true leader will always stand for what is right, even if it is not <u>popular</u>. Nehemiah saw the people being disobedient, and he made a call for change. He addressed difficult issues without <u>compromising</u>. True leaders will do the same.

 \rightarrow Nehemiah was not concerned with people doing what <u>he</u> wanted, but rather doing what <u>God</u> wanted. The best way to move people in the right direction is by showing them the "big picture" of what God desires.

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
