## Character Study: Nathanael The Love of Scripture Various Bible Passages

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• In the first three Gospels, Nathanael is referred to in the list of Apostles as "<u>Bartholomew</u>" (his family name, from "Bar Tolmai," meaning "son of Tolmai"). However, John, the only writer who sheds light on the life of this Apostle, uses the name "Nathanael" (meaning "<u>God</u> has <u>given</u>").

• Nathanael was from Cana of Galilee (John 21:2), and first heard about Jesus from Philip. He was initially troubled, however, by Philip's description of Jesus as being "of <u>Nazareth</u>." He asked, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" The city had a reputation of being corrupt, but Philip simply responded by saying, "<u>Come</u> and <u>see</u>." (John 1:45-46)

• When Nathanael first approached the Messiah, Jesus recognized him as a true Israelite "in whom there is no <u>deceit</u>." Baffled by how Jesus knew who he was, the Lord explained that He had seen him earlier under a fig tree (fig trees often served as a place of shade for private meditation). Nathanael would have known he was alone, so this astonished him as he recognized the Lord's omniscience and true <u>identity</u>. (John 1:47-49)

• History shows that Nathanael took the gospel to Persia (the area of modern day Iran) and Armenia (near southern Russia). He faced death as a martyr, though accounts differ as to the means of his death. One account states he was tied up and cast into the sea; another states he was crucified.

#### What's God doing?

> Philip's words to Nathanael in John 1:45 reveal that Nathanael was <u>knowledgeable</u> about <u>Scripture</u>. Yet unlike Philip, who wrestled with understanding Christ's deity, Nathanael expressed full confidence and <u>faith</u> right away. God used his love for God's Word to help him see Christ for who He is (and that was only the beginning; see John 1:50-51)!

#### What's to learn?

 $\rightarrow$  What is meant by Nathanael's question concerning Jesus being from Nazareth? Was he skeptical, judgmental, or just curious? We do not know. Maybe he was just confused (Micah 5:2 said the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem. He was, but then grew up in Nazareth). Whatever the reason, the fact is Nathanael was asking an <u>honest</u> question. There is nothing wrong with people asking honest questions, so we should not be offended (Philip wasn't!). We must just encourage them to "<u>come</u> and <u>see</u>!"

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
