## Character Study: David Part 6 – David's Repentance II Samuel 12:1-23

#### What's happening?

- After David's sin, the Lord sent the prophet Nathan to speak to him. Nathan told David a story of a <u>rich</u> man, who, though he had many animals, took a <u>poor</u> man's only <u>lamb</u> in order to feed a traveler. (12:1-4)
- Hearing the story, David became enraged, saying the rich man must die. Nathan stunned David, revealing that <u>David</u> was the rich man he was referring to. He explained that God had abundantly <u>blessed</u> David, yet David willingly <u>despised</u> God's commandments by killing Uriah and taking his wife. (12:5-9)
- The Lord spoke through Nathan, telling David that as a result of his sin, the sword (murder) would plague his family, enemies within his own family would be against him, and his wives would be taken from him. But unlike David's sin, which was done in <u>private</u>, these things would come to pass <u>openly</u> where everyone would see. (12:10-12)
- David was full of <u>sorrow</u> and <u>confessed</u> his sin. Nathan told David that God would spare his life, but because of the seriousness of his actions, David's child would die. (12:13-14)
- The child of David and Bathsheba became ill, and David <u>fasted</u> and <u>pleaded</u> with the Lord for the child until he passed away. (12:15-23)

### What's God doing?

> God is showing that there are <u>consequences</u> for sin. David's sin was intentional, and some of it was even strategically planned out. The punishment David faced shows very clearly how <u>offended</u> God is by sin.

#### What's to learn?

- $\rightarrow$  From this lesson, it is apparent how God views sin. God <u>hated</u> sin in David's day, just as He <u>hates</u> sin today.
- → The consequences for sin are always <u>worse</u> than we think they will be. Sin greatly affects us, as well as those around us.
- → God desired David's <u>repentance</u>, as He does ours when we sin. Even though David would still face consequences from his sin, he still <u>confessed</u> and was <u>sorrow</u> for his actions (Ps. 32:3-4; Ps. 51).
