Character Study: Elijah Part 3 – Elijah and the Widow I Kings 17:8-24

What's happening?

• While remaining at the brook without water, Elijah was told by the Lord to travel to <u>Zarephath</u> where he would find a <u>widow</u> who would provide for him. (17:8-9)

• Elijah traveled to Zarephath and found the widow at the city's gate. He asked her for water and bread, but she told him that she only had a handful of <u>flour</u> and a little <u>oil</u>. (17:10-12)

• Elijah told the widow not to <u>fear</u>, but to go ahead and make the bread because the Lord had said the food would not run out. They ate for several <u>days</u> without the flour or oil ever being used up. (17:13-16)

• The widow had a son who became <u>sick</u> and <u>died</u>. The widow was very upset. Elijah took the child to the upper room and asked the Lord to <u>revive</u> him. The Lord heard his <u>prayer</u> and brought the boy back to life. Seeing her son alive, the widow recognized Elijah as a true <u>man</u> of <u>God</u>. (17:17-24)

What's God doing?

> God was molding Elijah into a man of faith. Elijah had been taken out of his <u>comfort zone</u> and placed in situations where he had to learn to <u>trust</u> God. Through this time, God had also revealed His miraculous power both to Elijah and the widow. God is leaving no doubt that He can be trusted.

What's to learn?

 \rightarrow When we follow God in obedience, we may face <u>difficult</u> days. One of the biggest difficulties may come from being taken out of our comfort zones and learning to <u>adjust</u> to what God has for us. In these moments, do not give up. God is doing something in your life that only He can do. And when God is doing something, He always has a <u>reason</u>. Press forward and the end goal will come into clearer focus!

 \rightarrow Always remember that God is working to do things around us that we cannot do by our own <u>power</u>. Just as Elijah had to trust God to raise the boy from the dead, we too have to trust God to do the <u>impossible</u>!
