Character Study: Jonah Part 1 – A Prophet on the Run Jonah 1:1-17

What's happening?

- Jonah was from Gath-hepher, a village in <u>Galilee</u>. He was a prophet who lived around the time of <u>800-750 B.C.</u> (note II Kings 14:25).
- The Lord came to Jonah and gave him specific instructions. He was to go to <u>Nineveh</u> (a large Gentile city in Assyria) and let the people know that their wickedness had displeased Lord. (1:1-2)
- Jonah headed in the opposite direction out of fear. He tried to flee from "the <u>presence</u> of the Lord" by taking a boat to <u>Tarshish</u>. (1:3)
- The ride was interrupted as the Lord sent out <u>strong winds</u> that threatened the safety of the boat. The other people onboard cried out to their gods in vain, and tossed cargo overboard to lighten the ship. Before long, it was discovered that Jonah was to blame for their trouble. (1:4-10)
- Jonah told them the sea would become calm if he was <u>thrown</u> overboard. After realizing they could no longer fight the raging waters, they threw Jonah overboard while pleading for the Lord's mercy. The sea became calm and the people greatly feared the Lord. (1:11-16)
- The Lord sent a big <u>fish</u> which swallowed up Jonah. Jonah found himself in the belly of the fish <u>three</u> days and <u>three</u> nights. (1:17)

What's God doing?

> God told Jonah to "arise" and "go." It was not a suggestion, it was a <u>command!</u> We see here an Old Testament <u>mission</u> endeavor as Jonah (a Hebrew) was being sent to go across cultural barriers to a Gentile city. The question was how long would he resist his calling!

What's to learn?

- → With every step, Jonah thought he was getting farther from the Lord, but that was <u>impossible</u>. All he was doing was placing himself in a situation where God had to use more difficult extremes to get his attention.
- → Jonah called himself a God <u>fearing</u> person (1:9), though it was only the people on the ship who showed a genuine fear of the Lord. Throughout this chapter, Jonah shows no response that indicates any <u>reverence</u> for God. It is a shame when those who truly know the Creator of the Universe take His grace lightly and do not live for Him.

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
