Character Study: Solomon Part 3 – Solomon's Wisdom Turns Worldly I Kings 9-11

What's happening?

• God appeared to Solomon following the completion of the temple. He promised that if Solomon and the people remained obedient, God's hand of <u>blessing</u> would continually be upon them. (9:1-9)

• Solomon's wealth and popularity continued to grow. He built a large <u>wall</u> around Jerusalem and built up the other <u>cities</u> in his kingdom. He was able to obtain an abundance of <u>gold</u>, <u>horses</u> and <u>chariots</u>. The Queen of <u>Sheba</u> visited King Solomon and said the stories she had heard did not come close to describing how truly amazing his kingdom was. (9:10-10:29)

• Solomon loved many foreign <u>women</u>, women whom the Israelites were to avoid. He had <u>700</u> wives, and as he grew old, they turned his heart away from following the Lord (A king having many wives was a symbol of power at that time, but it was never blessed by God. For more on the issue of polygamy see "Jacob – Part 2"). Solomon's wives lured him into following false <u>gods</u>. He even built a place for pagan worship. (11:1-8)

What's God doing?

> In the law (Deut. 17:16-17), God had stated three things that kings over Israel should not do: (1) obtain great numbers of <u>horses</u>, (2) take many <u>wives</u>, and (3) gather large amounts of <u>silver</u> and <u>gold</u>.

> Too many horses and too much gold would cause a king not to <u>rely</u> on God, and wives could pull a king's <u>heart</u> away from the Lord. Notice that Solomon had failed on each point (note: horses - 10:26, 28-29; wives – 11:1-3; silver and gold - 10:14-15, 23, 27). God had given Solomon great wisdom, but he began using it for <u>fleshly</u> purposes.

What's to learn?

 \rightarrow God had blessed Solomon more than any other king, but Solomon still wanted more. If your heart is set on getting <u>material</u> things, you will never be <u>satisfied</u> with what you have.

 \rightarrow "Things" can distract us and get our focus off of how God desires to use us. Is your life's goal to gain "<u>stuff</u>" or to <u>live</u> for God's glory? This is a big question we each must answer as we think about the purpose for our existence. Are you living for yourself or are you living for God?

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
