How We Know the Bible Is Trustworthy

The Bible Is Inerrant

Inerrancy refers to the fact that the Bible is truthful and without error in regards to everything of which it speaks. This is seen in the very character of God:

- God cannot lie (Titus 1:2; Heb. 6:18).
- The Bible comes from the very words of God (note lesson on inspiration).
- Therefore, we can trust His Word to be nothing but truth (II Sam. 7:28; Prov. 30:5; John 17:17).

Jesus affirmed the fact that Scripture is a source of truth:

- He constantly referred to Scripture as a source of truth (examples: Matt. 4:4, 7, 10; Mark 11:17; Luke 18:20; etc.)
- He confirmed many O.T. events as being true (Mark 13:19 – creation; Mark 10:6-9 – Adam and Eve; Luke 17:26-27 – the flood; Matt. 12:40 – Jonah and the whale; etc.)
- He was confident that everything Scripture said would be fulfilled (Matt. 5:17-18; John 10:35).

Our Bible is nothing less than the truth of God (Col. 1:5; Eph. 1:13). Jesus Himself, being the Word made flesh, was full of truth (John 1:14; John 14:6; Eph. 4:21).

The Bible Is Reliable

The facts and events recorded in the Bible have never been disproved. In fact, archaeology has verified the history of Egypt, Assyria, Babylonia, (etc.) as recorded in the Bible. Babylonian artifacts prove that those people had an understanding of events such as creation, the fall of man and the flood. Also, secular history confirms figures such as Herod the Great (Matt. 2:16-18), Herod Agrippa (Acts 12:1), and Gallio (Acts 18:12-17), among many others. Time after time, God's Word has proven itself to be reliable.

To say that the Bible could have recorded even just one error opens the possibility of countless errors. Knowing that God is the perfect source of all truth, we can be confident that His Word is perfect as well.

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
