Christian Doctrine Salvation (Part 4) The Effects of Salvation

Three Main Effects of Salvation

When a person experiences salvation through faith in Christ, there are several results and effects that occur simultaneously. Last week we focused on the results of salvation in regard to our status in relation to God; this week we will focus on the effects of salvation in regard to how we live. These effects include:

> Regeneration

Regeneration refers to God's act of giving new <u>life</u> to someone who is spiritually <u>dead</u>. It is a work of the Holy Spirit in which someone is "<u>born again</u>" (Titus 3:5; John 3:3-7). This involves:

- Going from being spiritually <u>dead</u> to spiritually <u>alive</u> (from darkness to light) (Eph. 2:1, 5; Col. 1:13; I Pet. 2:9).
- Receiving a new <u>nature</u> (Ezek. 36:26-27; II Pet. 1:4).
- Becoming a new <u>creation</u> (II Cor. 5:17; Eph. 2:10; 4:24).

As a regenerated person, a believer now has a new perspective, new desires and the ability to live a righteous life (Rom. 6:13; Eph. 5:8; Col. 3:9-10; I John 2:29).

Freedom from Sin

Salvation sets a person free from the <u>power</u> of sin. Though once in bondage to sin, a believer has a new freedom that means we are now:

- Set free from the power of sin and able to live in <u>victory</u> over it (Rom. 6:6-7, 12; I John 5:4).
- Able to <u>offer</u> ourselves to God and <u>live</u> our lives for Him (Rom. 6:11, 18, 22; 12:1; Eph. 4:22-24).

> Indwelling of the Holy Spirit

At the moment of salvation, the Holy Spirit comes to live within each believer (Rom. 8:9; I Cor. 6:19-20). The Holy Spirit <u>conforms</u> us into the image of Christ as He:

- <u>Directs</u> us toward godliness (John 16:18; Rom. 8:14).
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
