I Peter 1:3-9

The Believer's Hope through Trials

- > In what sense do you think our hope is a "living" hope (v.3)? Our hope is based in Christ's resurrection – the fact He is alive (He is "living") proves that our hope is a reality.
- > What do you see in verses 4 and 5 that show our salvation is eternally secure (i.e. can't be lost)? <u>Our inheritance is already reserved for us and we are kept by the power of God.</u>
- > We are told we can rejoice through trials? For what reasons is that true according to verses 6-7? Because trials are temporary, and because they show our faith is genuine.
- > How are trials intended to impact our faith? They are to strengthen and purify us, allowing our faith to bring glory to God. They also increase our joy as we anticipate Christ's return.

Application

When we go through a difficult experience, we often think of ourselves as innocent victims who deserve better. The fact is, God says to expect trials for they serve a great purpose.
